It also provides space for you to record some of the couple's answers to those questions. The writing prompts, prayers, and quotes are included to encourage you and provide space for your reflections. A Couple Record for one couple is provided for your personal or parish record of this part of the couple's marriage prep journey.

Multiple-Use, Many Couples

Once you've previewed all the videos in our course, you can use this guide to record your own notes and personal reflections. It will serve as a master guide that you can use with many couples.

Each time you lead a new couple through the course, you can use this guide to direct conversations in your meetings with them. If you'd like to record their responses to questions or create a record of your meetings, use a new Couple Record along with this guide. Additional Couple Records can be downloaded on our website or photocopied from this guide.

WAYS TO USE THE COURSE

SELF-LED

Engaged Couples Working Through The Program On Their Own Time

Couples register for the course and gain access to the online portal. After filling out the intake form, they receive instructions to download or print a “His” and “Hers” Discussion Guide. The guides provide relevant questions, journaling prompts, and conversation starters that encourage meaningful reflections and conversations throughout the course.

The guides follow along with the video teaching which covers prescribed topics for thorough preparation for the sacrament of marriage. Each video series ends with a quiz to ensure couples have a proper understanding of the principles taught.

When all course videos and quizzes have been completed, couples can download and print their official Certificate of Completion. The certificate can be emailed or hand-delivered to the parish where their wedding will take place.

MENTOR-LED

Engaged Couples Working With A Facilitator, Clergy, or Sponsor Couple

Completion of Living Our Faith In Love with a leader can be accomplished in many ways. The course is flexible for both couples and those leading them through the experience, so we encourage you to set up a system that works for you.

Here are a few examples of how leaders use our course:


Nine Weekly Meetings: Initial “Get-to-know-you” meeting followed by one meeting per week for 8 weeks. Between meetings, couples watch all videos in one topic and complete the His and Hers Discussion Guides on their own. At the weekly meeting, leaders will direct the conversation using this Leader’s Guide, and couples can discuss anything that came up during their private study.

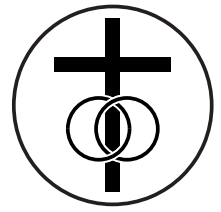
WAYS TO USE THE COURSE

Three Meetings in Three Months: First meeting establishes expectations and provides time for prayer and encouragement. Second meeting is a check-in at the halfway point with time for couples to ask questions and leaders to provide direction, prayer, and encouragement. Final meeting to confirm completion of the course, receive Certificate of Completion for parish records, and finalize details of the wedding ceremony. This could also include time for prayer and the sacrament of reconciliation.

Monthly Marriage Prep - 6 Months: (Works with one couple/leader or small groups): Leaders meet with couples to explain the course and its components. Couples work through the course at their own pace, taking notes about topics and situations they'd like to discuss with leaders. Then, the couples and leaders get together for a monthly meeting. They engage in a relationship-building activity like a shared meal, ice-breaker questions, or a board game. After the fun, leaders pray for the couple/s and initiate a discussion based on one of the video topics and/or the couple's/s' questions.

PART 2: MARRIAGE AS A SACRAMENT

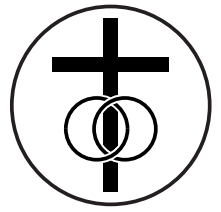

2. NURTURING INTIMACY

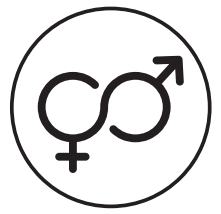

3. ROMANCE AND DATING

Dating and making each other a priority help to nurture intimacy in a marriage. Keeping romance alive takes intention and planning.

4. GROWING IN MARITAL INTIMACY

Couples will always have to work on trust and forgiveness. Resources for growing in intimacy can include the Sacrament of Reconciliation and good counseling. They should surround themselves with Christian communities and those who can keep them accountable to honor their marriage.

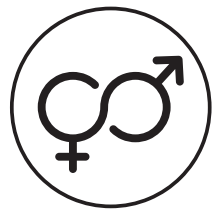

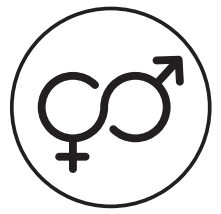

1. FORMING THE NEW FAMILY

A new marriage is a new family, but each partner's family of origin is also part of the new family. Faith life experiences differ between families.

2. MARRIAGE AND COMMITMENT WITHIN YOUR FAMILY OF ORIGIN

People have different family experiences. Some had a traditional nuclear family, and some experienced divorce, death of a parent, or blended families. These realities influence perceptions of commitment and hopes and fears regarding marriage.

3. WHEN FAMILY ISSUES DIRECTLY IMPACT YOUR MARRIAGE

Situations such as illness of extended family members can impact marriages in different ways.

4. THE FOUR PILLARS OF MARRIAGE

Communication: The family of origin's conflict-management style can influence your marriage.

Romance & Intimacy: Levels of comfort with showing affection vary between families.

Money: The family of origin's finances and their handling of them can influence a couple's approach to shared finances.

Parenting: Parenting styles of your family of origin need to be examined.

5. WHEN FAMILY ISSUES DIRECTLY IMPACT YOUR MARRIAGE

Families of origin have differing ways of honoring traditions, celebrating holidays, and setting boundaries. Getting married and starting a new family presents an opportunity to start new traditions. No one has a perfect family, but we are called to have a *holy family*.

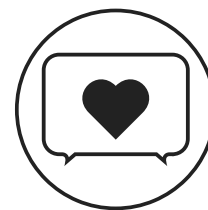

1. GAINING SKILLS FOR HEALTHY COMMUNICATION

Personality differences and perspectives can cause conflict. Skills are needed to avoid and resolve conflicts. Skills build intimacy and confidence. Marriages also need compassion and loving-kindness. Love is a decision and an action, a way of being and doing.

Active listening - engaging with what is heard as well as feelings, emotions, experiences.

Gained insight - the prize of effective dialogue; learning and growing in your marriage.

3. THE ROLE OF RECONCILIATION

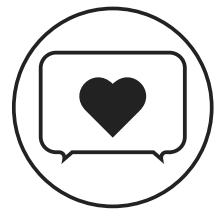
Good reconciliation recognizes the difference between forgiving and excusing and whether either is appropriate. In attempts to forgive and forget, couples may minimize problems.

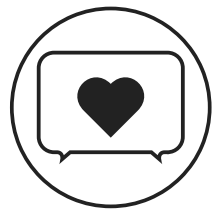

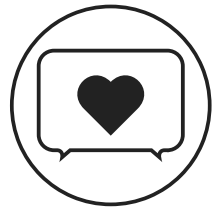

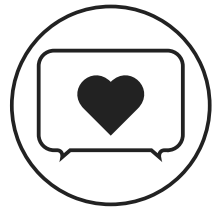

2. LEARNING HOW TO TALK ABOUT MONEY

Keys to Unlocking Good Conversations About Money:

- Understand what money symbolizes for your partner
- Approach one another as people of goodwill
- Agree to avoid secrets

3. HOW TO RESOLVE TOP MONEY FIGHTS

Couples should figure out a system that works for them, discover who is best suited for each role, and pray about what their parish contribution will be.

What are they going to fight about? *Overspending, Expense to Income Ratio, Disorganization.*

4. PRACTICAL TIPS AND ORGANIZATION

Money Tools:

Having a budget and a system for organizing their finances is essential. Ideas for organization include a bill folder, long and short-term file boxes, and a family email address.

It is also important to have proper insurance coverage and plan for the future with retirement savings and preparing a Last Will and Testament.

Debt should be used wisely and sparingly to prevent overspending and sabotaging future goals.

NFP promotes healthy communication and respect within a marriage. It has no side effects and is completely free. NFP avoids the need for sterilization. NFP is the only family planning method endorsed by the Catholic church.

Women can monitor their health with cycle charting. Understanding the signs of fertility can help women more closely monitor their health. Increased communication helps couples connect emotionally and spiritually.

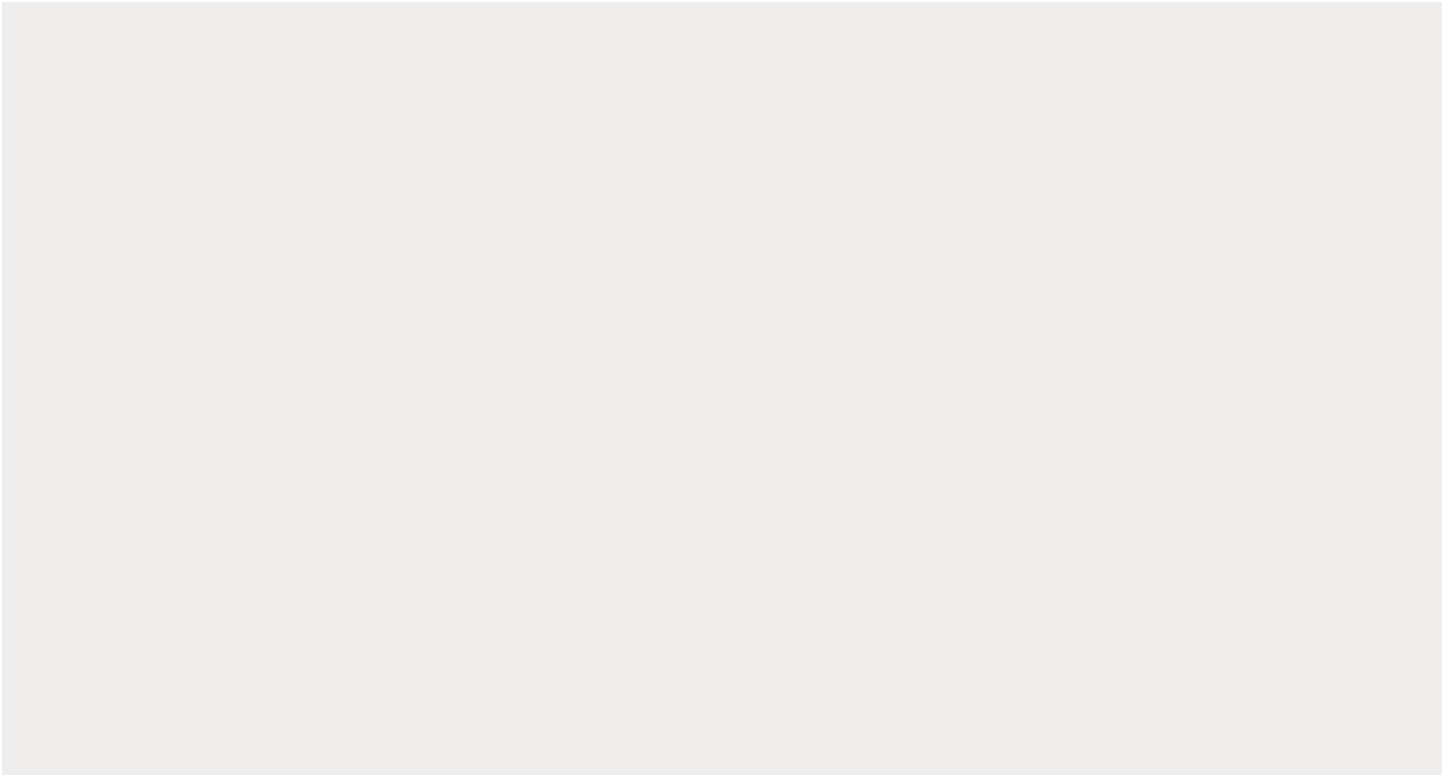

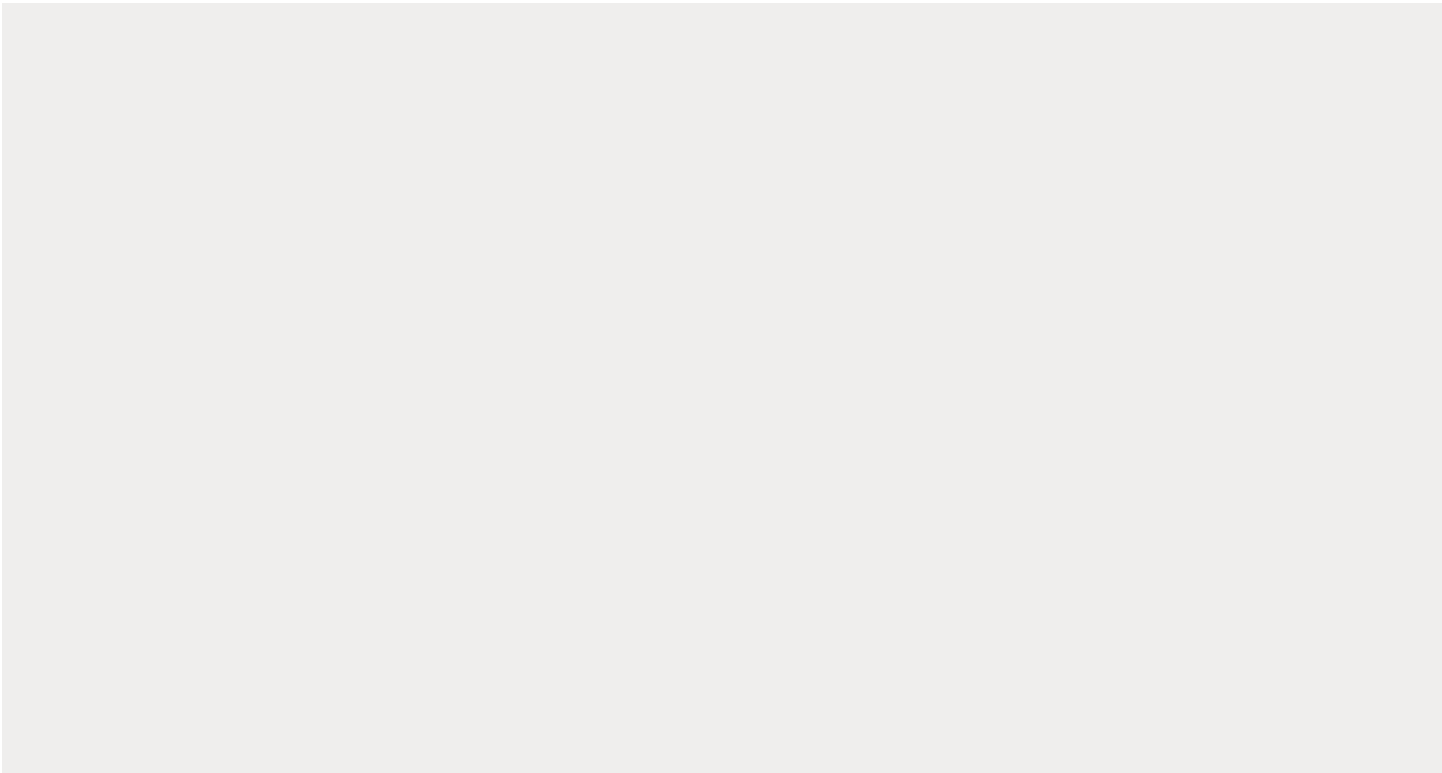

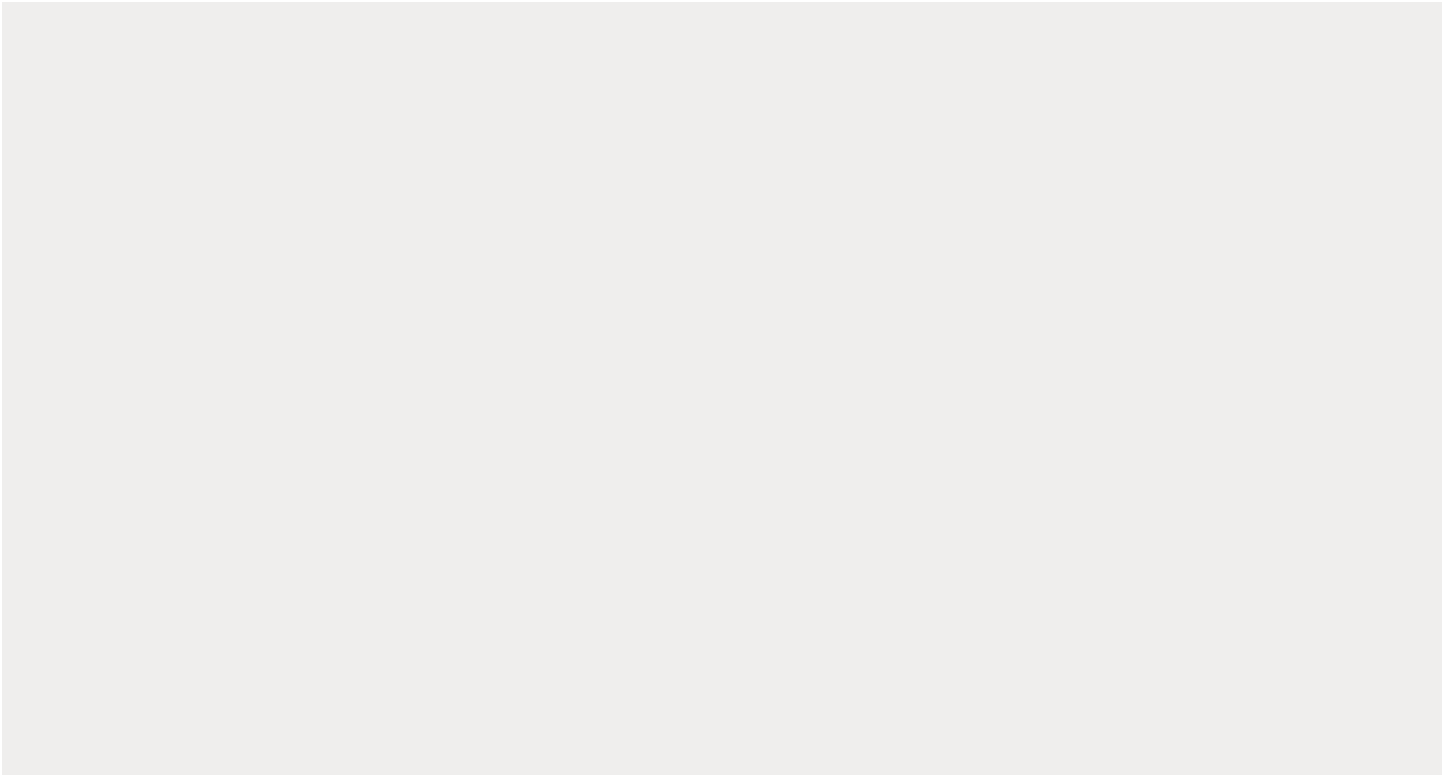
